

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President's Message






reetings to all!

Greetings Members,

I have some great stuff to share this month. The finale of the Blacklock story is included. Thanks for hanging in there with that one, but it was important to share the pre–Model T era story as well. Thanks to Robbie Dalton for the Begonia Rally report and also to the Romsey Men's Shed for the restoration update on their TT Truck.

Some members may have heard, during the month that I was successful in gaining a new full time job. I have been working casually or on contract for quite a few years. Accessory Wire Wheels—Alan Flude

Club member, Alan Flude, has recently completed a long lasting restoration project of his Veteran wire wheels. Inspired by his project, I have begun restoration of a set of the same model and style myself. Alan has shared some pictures of is wires and accessories which have come up a treat.

Alan says...

'Each Budd wheel has 48 double butted spokes. It took 7 wheels to get enough original spokes to rebuild 5 wheels. These 23 X 3 1/2" Beaded edge rims are all original, in very good condition. The Budd wheels were rebuilt by Steve Hood at Vintage Rims Australia QLD. Bruce Feldtmann at Egge Machine Co. repaired the hubs.'

I have had a set awaiting restoration for a long time. Inspired by Alan's completed job, I started disassembly in preparation for sand blasting and re-spoking. Unfortunately all my rims are beyond help so I have accumulated a set of original beaded edge rims which will have to be "dimpled" before assembly with new spokes. During disassembly (cutting the spokes with an angle grinder) I was surprised by the tension and strength of the wire wheels. This strength was mentioned in many early advertising flyers promoting the advantages of wire wheels over wooden spokes. Their common usage in racing supports this.

Restoration Story



Romsey Men's Shed TT Truck Restoration Project

It is a pleasure to present this month, a restoration progress story from the Romsey Men's Shed. It was great to meet Jeff and the members recently when delivering some spares that they had purchased from me. Their TT Truck project is a very nice old original TT with some great history and original accessories. Thanks to Jeff for supplying the article. I have added a few additional photos that I took during my visit. Jeff and the guys would be pleased to hear from other TT owners in the club to check out body and assembly details of similar Trucks.

In October 2022 a 1925 TT Truck was donated to the Romsey Men's Shed to be restored, and eventually belong to the Romsey community.

The truck was donated by a local earthmoving business and had been up on a rack in a shed for over 35 years, so had a thick layer of dust. The truck apparently came from a builders supply yard somewhere in the Macedon Ranges, where it was fitted with a Furphy water tank cut down to make a tipping tray. The tray was tipped by hand and had a hefty chain to limit the tip angle. The truck did not come with the tray, in fact the picture below is the day we picked it up and were allowed to give it a pressure wash in the donor's wash bay.

Discussion has been around what to restore the truck to, as over the years the cab had been cut away, and what wood is left is in a sorry state.

The team have decided that the most recognisable "T" to the general public would be a C Cab style as per the green example (right).

We have started mocking up seats (Mazda CX7 for the exercise), so we can get a better driver relationship to the pedals and steering wheel. We have a supply of 13mm particle board to make up mock-up cabs to get the dimensions and look that we want.

We are also following up various 'TT' owners with a view to measure and photograph other C cabs. At this stage the engine has almost zero compression so has not been able to be started despite having the valve clearances increased (inlets were sunken). All four coils have been cleaned and set up using a home made test rig and are giving very good spark at the correct amperage. One needed new points which we got from Lang's T Model spares in the USA. The current aim is to at least get the engine running to assess the condition of the gearbox and differential. This truck we are told is a little rarer than some as it is fitted with a Moore

two speed gearbox just

ahead of the differential. The front axle also has wider springs which were an aftermarket item produced by Henderson Spring works in North Melbourne.

The truck was on display at a recent Macedon Ranges Car Club meeting at Hanging Rock. At this massive gathering of cars we were offered a radiator

restoration by Aussie Desert Coolers which we gratefully accepted. The head has been removed, cleaned, new spark plugs and leads, and painted "Ford Blue" for the moment. Estimated budget to complete this project is around \$12,000.

At some time in the future (Our president calls this a "Multi Generational Project"), the truck will be used in various community parades and activities including the Kyneton Daffodil Parade.



"Proprietor & Staff, Blacklock Motor Garage & Cycle Dept, Albury"



About 1913/1914, Kiewa St – Fred Blacklock is on the right of the top photo

In 1910 the business moved to new more spacious premises in Kiewa Street. The *Albury Banner* described the new workshop:

Mr F C Blacklock's Garage. The new premises situated in Kiewa-street, opposite Mate and Co, lately purchased by Mr Blacklock give some indication of the vast strides this enterprising citizen has made in the estimation of the cycling and motoring public of Albury and district. The building has been altered and added to in the most up-to-date way; consistent with dealing with the ever increasing volume of trade which first class work and fair dealing has built up. A spacious front shop, stocked with everything which experience dictates as indispensable to cyclists of every description. Motorists' accessories from A to Z, 5 gun parts, guns, rifles, and shooters' needs are all to be found right to hand. A splendidly equipped workshop, backed up by a staff of skilled and experienced mechanics ...

Blacklock Ford - Albury

In November 1913 Blacklock's announced that the business had accepted the 'Ford' agency, the *Albury Banner* making the announcement on November 28:

Mr Fred C Blacklock makes an important announcement in this issue of the 'Banner.' He advises that he has accepted 'The Ford' agency ... the most astonishing thing in connection with 'The Ford' is the price—£190 for a 20 hp (single seater) and £210 for a five seated body.

Blacklock's business interests expanded in 1914. In March, the *Border Morning Mail* had the news that "Owing to the expansion of the motor business at Mr F C Blacklock's garage, he has completed the purchase of Messrs Robbins and Porter's business, and all their stock and plant."

In March 1912, Blacklock had paid £920 for the skating rink site in Kiewa-street. On May 8, 1914, Albury saw the grand opening of his Theatre Royal on the site, built by Frew and Logan. Stuart Logan designed the unusual façade, described as "a blend of Moorish and Gothic and towered to a great height."

The car business continued to expand and in April 1920, the Albury Banner reported:

Recent additions made by Mr F C Blacklock to his motor premises and repair shops in Albury have made the establishment one of the largest of the kind in the State. We believe it is now the largest workshop in the country districts, embracing as it does not only every branch of repair work to cars, bicycles and motor tyres, but also some engineering departments ... Having recently purchased Brunner's property in Kiewa-street, he will be able to make extensions in that street. The business premises of Mr Carew in Townsend-street have also been acquired, with the object of eventually carrying the works right through to that street from Kiewa-street.


In 1924, Blacklock's opened their expanded premises on Kiewa Street and by the end of the decade had extended through to Townsend Street. Speaking to the *Border Morning Mail* at the time, and referring to his first motor car, the Minerva that he imported in 1905, Blacklock said that "I felt several inches taller when I got that car going and drove it down Dean Street. Its appearance created a mild sensation. There was no need to register cars or worry about licenses then."

1892-

Blacklock's business started-first as cycles and repairs. 1900

Motor cycles were added to the list, and the fame of the firm spread as importers and repairers. 1905

The first car was imported, and was quite an event in Albury.

Business had grown beyond the bounds of the premises, and the present site was purchased and built on and more staff engaged. 1915-1920-

Further additions to staff, plant and premises. Fame for fair dealing and good work renowned.

1924

Staff of 37 going continuously—Turning, fitting, oxy-welding, blacksmithing, vulcanizing, painting, trimming, motor cycle, cycle and general work, and general engineering.

New two-storey front built and shops enlarged and fine show-room added. Business larger than ever.

When in Albury, see BLACKLOCK'S. It has grown solidly, like the townon good foundations.

Frederick Charles Blacklock died suddenly on April 20, 1930. An obituary in the Border Morning Mail read (in part):

Mr Blacklock's business activities extended over a wide area. He was a large employer of labour, his staff numbering from 45 to at times 60 persons. His success in building up his great business was due to his integrity and application. His watchword was service and that he always rendered in full measure

Mr Blacklock was never selfishly absorbed in his own affairs He played his part as a citizen in his native town's activities. When a young man, he was a keen footballer and played with the old Albury team of that time. He was a generous supporter of all local movements, served a term as alderman and was a committeeman on practically every public institution in Albury. Mr Blacklock took a keen interest in Rotary and was a member of the Albury Club ... His friends were legion in all walks of life, to all he was the same gentle kind hearted man.

It was reported that his funeral "was the largest ever seen in Albury, extending over a mile in length, and more than 1000 mourners assembled at the graveside."

After his death, the business that Fred had established continued to thrive. Arriving in late 1930, Mrs Blacklock's nephew, Mr Robert Farrell, took over management of the business.




