

Article of Interest



TRAVELLING PICTURE-SHOW MEN. VICTORIA. 1920-22

A favourite Saturday night movie was the Aussie made "Picture Show Man", featuring well known Aussie actors of the day, John Meillon and Gary McDonald. I was surprised recently, to come across the following picture and text of one of the original picture show men of the day, set up to travel in their trusty 1915 T Tourer. — *Ed*



In the first decades of the 20th Century when 'moving pictures' were a novelty, purpose built theatres (cinemas) only existed in major cities.

Showmen would therefore travel the dusty roads bringing their entertainment to smaller rural communities.

These men would bring everything with them including Screen, Projector, Films, even a Ticket Box. They would book local shop-fronts or halls, or if necessary, set up in the open air. They would screen their silent, usually one reeler movies to the local population over a night or two, pack-up and move onto the next town.

Here, a couple of Show men are

photographed with shoeless local children. They are about to set off to the next town somewhere in country Victoria, carrying with them everything they need in their T Model Ford and trailer. Much detail to be seen if you enlarge the photo, including the little boy sitting on the crank handle. Note the large spotlight affixed to the front of the bonnet-less car... necessary for night driving on primitive (read rough) roads.



Restoration Update



I was once told, if you drive a T long enough, you will one day break a crankshaft. I have been driving Ts awhile, and this is the second time it has happened, ironically twice in the same car, years apart!

At the July meeting, my broken crankshaft was viewed with interest by the members present so I thought I would share it here. Some breakages appear somewhat random, but it is always nice to find a reason. Model T crankshafts

are small and weak by design, however, in the pursuit of balance and/or smooth running, the previous restorer/rebuilder had ground large amounts of material from critical areas of the crank adjacent to the bearing journal areas, in what appears to have been the pursuit of balancing. I have no doubt, the removal of material close to the bearing journals has weakened the crank and subject it to more stress than it could handle.

Fortunately, I was able to source a good original standard size crank to replace the broken one. It was crack tested, the mains and rod bearings reamed to suit and then reassembled. A big thanks to Frank van Ekeren for assisting with vital tools and equipment and a wealth of knowledge about assembly. A new camshaft and bearings were also installed along with a new transmission brake drum, and a turbo 400 clutch assembly. I particularly enjoyed my first test run drive after the repairs and look forward to many more years of driving in this T. — *Warwick Landy* —


Vice President, Chris has been keeping busy on numerous restoration and T repairs.

The new radiator has become the cornerstone of a new project which truly has become a family project. Grandfather Neil has been helping out with panel and assembly work on the project. Pictured outside the showroom in 1925 showing 3 of the new Model range on display. A rare RHD Canadian supplied Coupe, A Tarrant bodied Tourer and also a bare TT Truck chassis ready for the customers own custom built body.

Plenty Motors opened its doors in 1925 and continued operating from the same site on the corner of High Street and David Street until at least 1974. Now a commercial shop, it bares little resemblance to its days as a garage. The garage made an immediate impact when it was chosen as the site of the first outer suburban ambulance service. This continued until a custom built station could be constructed for the ambulance service. The service covered Preston, Northcote and Heidelberg.

Plenty Motors not only serviced cars and sold petrol but also was a car sales room and sold both Fords and Chevrolets as part of its inventory. As part of the Made in Australia week in 1930 Plenty Motors exhibited the latest Ford motor vehicle body. The Ford factory in Geelong could assemble at car in just under nine hours, including building the chassis frames, painting, trims, and a road test.

In July 1931, engineer Stanley Hughes attempted to steal petrol from the bowser at Plenty Motors, damaging the bowser in the process. At that time the owner of Preston Motors was Herbert Stewart.

Mr W. Maltzhan was the owner of Plenty Motors by 1934 and represented the Victorian Automobile Chamber of Commerce at a motor trade meeting in June of that year.

In 1942 a large amount of engineering equipment and tools were sold as the business changed hands. Amongst the items sold included lathes, drills, hydraulic hoses, spanners, pulleys, etc.

By the early 2000's the building was Gary's Car Radio and has since become a clothing shop.

Do any of our Northern suburbs members have any information about this dealership to add?

Restoration Update

First up, I've been working on a non-Model T project. Over the past couple of years, I've been restoring a Massey Ferguson tractor. I rebuilt the whole thing including new tyres, rebuilt the engine, gear box, repainted it in 2K paint and did lots more to it. It was a big job but it's done now. I was able to sell that straight away to a guy in Goughs Bay. It's now up there working again.

I have also been working on the Plymouth restoration but got sick of that. Since the tractor was no longer in the shed, I had some spare room, so I brought the Model T Ute project back home.

It had been at my Mum's place in the farm shed. I haven't done much to it in the last 2 years, so I needed to clean up the metal and panels. I treated them with rust cleaner. I've now fitted the doors on. I had to make 2 door hinges from scratch. I had to have 2 goes making them, the first attempt



didn't



come up too well, but I tried again, and the second attempt was more successful. I also made a one-piece windscreen frame to fit between the 26/27 windscreen posts. That took some time, but it has come up great.

So now I am now up to making the roof bows. The hoods frame and bows are almost finished. They just need some tweaking, then clean them up and final paint. I also ordered a '26 – '27 bonnet from Henry's. It arrived in 3 and a half weeks, so Ann and I went down to Henry's and picked it up. We spent the weekend down there and had a lovely lunch down the road in Daylesford and spent the afternoon looking around the town. There were some amazing antique shops and a chocolate shop for Ann. It really is lovely over that side of town.



Hopefully this spring I can get it painted, then it will be almost finished. I just have to cut and patch some rust out of the front mud guards, make the hood covering, get the interior done, floor, motor, gearbox, front end, back end, tyres, wheels. Oh, wait I've already done the spokes!

The Tuesday edition (15th August) of the Midland Express newspaper has an article on our TT restoration project. The article was featured on the front page of the newspaper with the article details a few pages in. We were quite excited to be interviewed and even happier to see the project placed on the front page.

We also have been donated an "In poor condition, but complete" 1926 T engine and gearbox. Internally we have been able to salvage most of the gearbox internals and the crankshaft. On the gearbox was also the "period correct" gear change pedal which will find its way onto our gearbox. The engine had been under a shearing shed the other side of St Arnaud for some 35 years,

A 1925 Model T Ford truck is putting skills to the test at Romsey Men's Shed. Local identity Doug Newnham donated

the model in September last year to give it a new lease on life. The proviso was that it be restored to its

original working condition and remain with the Romsey Men's Shed.

"It was pretty exciting the moment we got it going," shed secretary Eric Foster said.

"The first time it kicked over it sputtered. It was amazing to see it kicked back to life."

Ex-Army Reserve mechanic Jeff Smith is one of the project's key restorers and currently working on the engine.

Normally repairing old mowers to fundraise, he said the vehicle had set a whole new and exciting challenge. "It had been in the shed for about 35

"It had been in the shed for about 35 years," he said.

"We want to try and restore it as close to the original as possible but with a few changes. We're imagining the finished product will have a cabin in Romsey Men's Shed marcon with gold lettering."

Model T enthusiasts from outside of the shed have also assisted with advice. A crucial contributor has been Vic

Ashton from Woodend, who has completed

about 20 of his own restorations. "He has a wealth of knowledge about Model T Fords and has been really helpful," Mr Smith said.

"There are a lot of parts that we don't know are missing because we started restoring it from a bare skeleton."

Some parts will need to be specially ordered from the USA, while others can be sourced from fellow car enthusiasts, collectors and suppliers. Vital pieces the shed is now seeking to secure are tyres and tubes.

now seeking to secure are tyres and tubes The project has certainly achieved one the shed's main objectives of bringing people together and sharing skills.

Romsey Men's Shed is a not-for-profit association that supports men's mental health by providing a meeting place where men can come together.

It is hoped that once restored and used within the community, the Model T will help raise community awareness of the shed and the importance of men's health.

Volunteers aim to have the vehicle restored by 2025-26 (the vehicle's 100th birthday).

The Romsey Men's Shed has created a GoFundMe page for donations toward the project. They are also eager to hear from anyone with knowledge in Model T Fords and collectors with parts.

The engine has now been washed and has new valve guides, new valve seat inserts, new stainless one piece valves, the block decked, and also the head has a few thou off it to get it perfectly flat. The cylinder bores have had a light hone as we feel standard diameter pistons will still be suitable. The camshaft is in Dookie Victoria getting a grind and clean up. Adjustable cam followers are coming from Henry's as are a new set of Kevlar transmission bands. The chassis has also been returned from being sand blasted and primed ready for final painting. The four wheels have now been disassembled so the metal rims can be sandblasted and primed ready for new paint. The steering column in nearing completion after a complete tear down. The throttle and spark levers are with a Nickel plater in Nth Sunshine.

Of new parts we have the transmission screen kit, new brass contacts for in the coil box housing, new wiring loom, new gasket set including head gasket.

The front springs have now been stripped of all rust and painted. The ends of the long spring still need rebushing which is one of the next jobs along with cleaning and sanding/oiling, all of the wooden spokes.

Prior to disassembly of the truck we were able to get it running long enough to get an idea of any major issues with the gear box, Moore gearbox, or the Ruckstell differential but no untoward sounds were heard.


The Golden Oldies Tour 2024 will be held in and around Ballarat.








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
